It calls on us to reflect honestly and humbly upon our often 'qualified' faith. One of the curiosities of Christianity is that we are anxious to leap over Lent and jump enthusiastically into Easter. While this is understandable, it is also regrettable. It is only when we have wrestled with the limitations of our humanity that the miracle of grace becomes fully valued. When we peer out



on our lives from the bleakness of Good Friday, the sunrise of Easter and resurrection takes on a profound and rich meaning.

This faith of ours equips us for the joys and challenges of everyday life. Through faith we have an appreciation for the wonder of Creation and where we fit in this great cosmos. Faith places us in a community that stretches through the ages, far into the future, assuring us that we are never alone. By faith we hold the spiritual tools to discern choices that will sustain our lives and the lives of the people around us. Faith does not make life easy or trouble-free, but it grounds us with wisdom and the over-arching confidence of being loved by God. All of this arises out of our understanding of the Risen Christ---the miracle of Easter. As we live constructively and compassionately we embody that miracle anew.





## Giving from a Sense of Securities

C. Arthur Smith was a real United Church man. He had been a member all his life. In the various congregations that he attended over the years, he had held nearly every volunteer position and had often sung in the choir.

At age 97, Arthur called his minister, Rev. Jim at Britannia United Church in Ottawa and said, "I want to arrange a gift of securities in my will go to the congregation in memory of my wife, Isabel. Who should I talk to?" So Rev. Jim gave him the contact information for the regional Financial Development Officer.

Arthur was a very engaging man: physically able and quick of mind. He told wonderful stories about his life growing up around Magog in the Eastern Townships of Quebec and of his years working for Canada Border Services. He was also very astute about his finances. Over the years, he had taken great pride in his investments and held his broker in high esteem. Arthur Smith knew that it would be to his estate's best advantage if his gift was created by a donation of securities.

- The estate would receive a donation receipt for the full value of the shares to use against its income.
- It would pay no taxes on the capital gains. This
  Would provide a significant tax saving, since he
  had held some of his stock for many, many
  years.
- The net result: more of his estate would be left to His family than if the stocks were sold and the proceeds donated.

After discussing the various alternatives with the Financial Development Officer, Arthur went to talk to his broker. And his broker had even another idea. "Arthur," he said, "why don't you donate the shares now? You can live without the money; you'll get all the tax advantages now; and you'll be able to see the gift in action while you're still living."

So that's what Arthur Smith did. In the spring of 2010, he donated a portfolio of his most favoured stocks to Britannia United Church, creating a sizeable gift to establish The Isabel Elizabeth Smith Memorial Fund. The principal is to be held for a future major capital project, but in the meantime, the congregation can use the income earned by the fund toward current expenses.

With Arthur and his family present, the congregation celebrated his gift and Isabel's memory at a Sunday morning service in May, 2010. Unfortunately, Arthur

died in January 2011, but he died as he had lived: with both a love and spirit of generosity toward the United Church and his congregation.

### One Man's Garbage

One man's garbage is another man's treasure. Did You Know We Collect the Following?

Bread Bag Date Tabs – These are passed on to St. Martyrs and used in crafts to raise funds for wheelchairs in Third World Countries. Deposit in the corner drawer in the back of the Sanctuary.

Aluminum Pop Cans – (preferably squished flat.) These are passed on to the Shriners to help fund travel for sick children from the North. Deposit in the large bin in the kitchen.

Glasses - These are passed on to optometrists, then forwarded to Third world countries.

Deposit in the corner drawer in the back of the Sanctuary.

Aluminum Pop Can Tabs – passed on to Holy Cross where they are redeemed for wheel chairs. Deposit in the corner drawer in the back of the Sanctuary.

Campbell Labels – Soups – Broths – Sauces – These are redeemed for items used in the church. Currently the choir has some needs. Deposit in the corner drawer in the back of the Sanctuary.

**Used Postage Stamps –** These are passed on to The Bible Society to provide funds for the purchase of Bibles. Remove the corner with stamps from the envelope. We also have a stamp collector who uses some of the stamps. Deposit in the corner drawer in the back of the Sanctuary. Blankets for MB (for the needy and nursing homes) - Blankets that are knitted by several of our members. Wool may be dropped off at the church and left with Luci in the office.

Various people look after these projects, counting and delivering them. By setting any of these items aside and bringing them to church you are benefitting others. Home
