FROM THE STUDY

2014 was an interesting year but, aren't they all? I browsed through my datebook and was amazed at all the events, the meetings, the counselling sessions, the visits and the people involved that form the picture of my year. The word, 'eclectic' probably best describes the Windsor Park congregation. The people and activities reflect the diversity of our community and city as well as the openness of our church family. It would be hard to put a label on WPUC and that is, perhaps, our greatest strength.

Over the course of the year we hosted an Alzheimer's workshop, marriage preparation classes, Fifth Step sessions, a book club, concerts, women and alcohol workshop, a series on Science and Religion, craft sale, AOTS BBQ, picnic, a mountain of lost and found clothes, Jesus Fatwah series, Tot Time, Art Group, Country Blend concert, chili supper and bonfire, cookie walk, golf, curling, hampers, Thinking of You baskets, plus creative, locally-designed worship throughout the year. This represents only the tip of the iceberg as we continue to reach out and open our doors to our neighbours.

Some of the milestones we achieved this year included the retirement of our Lift Fund, exceeding our objective for the Mission and Service Fund of the United Church of Canada, sending over \$6,000 to the preschool in Gonubie, South Africa, celebrating baptisms, confirmation, weddings and welcoming new members. It was with sadness and thanks that we bade farewell to several of our long time members. It never ceases to amaze me how this congregation embraces those in grief bringing light and hope in the midst of pain.

My work with Winnipeg Presbytery is a reminder of the importance of working together with our partners in other United Churches. As many struggle with large buildings demanding repairs and alterations, others wrestle with diminishing membership and dislocation from their neighbourhood. This year Patrick and I have engaged in a series of informal gatherings with other clergy interested in discussing ways to invigorate our churches. Sharing what we are doing locally helps us to grow in understanding and in collaboration.

This year included a sabbatical in August and September. I am so grateful for this block of time to read, reflect and plan for my future. It was also precious time to spend with Erin and Sam at their wedding in Kelowna. In September Rick and I travelled to mark our 10th anniversary acknowledging that love is an

unexpected, priceless blessing. The year closed with the birth of our second grand-daughter.

WPUC has a unique culture. It is a place that invites and encourages participation and creativity. It is where the Holy Spirit has free rein to bring this faith of ours to life. Here we are challenged, tested and inspired to think and act with compassion and justice. We wrestle with what we believe and the action that proceeds from that faith. We generously make room for young and old, new and familiar, to lead us. This culture is nurtured by the wonderful, gifted staff who ensure that not a moment of my work day gets boring! Patrick, Laura, Luci, Myrna and Gina give their hearts and souls to our communal life which is nothing short of God's grace. So many of you support the staff team with countless hours of volunteer work that keeps this church humming on what is nothing short of an adventurous journey of faith and service to Christ.

As I so often say: As you have been blessed, make your life a blessing to others!

CHRISTIAN DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL

In August of 2014, the Christian Development Council reformed with co-chairs Paulette Cote and Laura Steidl. Currently on the council we also have: Patrick Woodbeck, Pat Lumsden, Heather Burnett and Melissa Horbas. The Christian Development Council is the council who oversees activities nurturing the faith journey of children, youth and adults.

The council met twice in the fall. The Christian development council oversees the following areas: Bible Adventures, Library, Technology (supporting the council and groups we oversee), Confirmation, Christian Vocation, Youth Group, Intergenerational Events, Tot Time, Baby Fold and Adult Education. Each area has a liaison who is contacting and developing a relationship with the people currently working in these areas and offering support where needed.

Highlights for 2014:

- Bible Adventures started on September 14th with a full complement of teachers and many eager children. On November 30 we hosted a breakfast meeting for the teachers and the Bible Adventures coordinating committee. We are very grateful for their commitment to the children of the church! Classes are grouped by age and meet each Sunday, with the exception being Praise Team contemporary services and special events, when the children meet as a large group.

- The church library is an ongoing project. Jan Shiaro is our current librarian and we thank her for her work in keeping this ministry going! We have begun to reorganize and cull the library so that out-of-date books can be replaced by current ones.
- The website has been updated. There is a new tab for Bible Adventures which had regular postings for the children during the season of Advent.
- The Youth Group/Intergenerational Corn Maze Event was a success with over 30 participants. The youth group has begun to meet regularly, approximately every 2 weeks.
- The congregational carolling event at St. Boniface Hospital on December 21 was very successful with 22 participants of all ages.
- A "meet and greet" event was held after church, during coffee time, on Dec. 7. There was positive feedback about the opportunity to chat with new people.
- Tot Time (formerly Moms and Tots), and Thursday morning Study Group started up for the fall season in October. There continues to be a need for volunteers to help share the leadership of the Tot Time group. The adult education group, "The Jesus Fatwah," started in November and was facilitated by Patrick.

We started last fall with a DVD presentation "Religions of the World" narrated by Ben Kingsley. It was a look into how each religion's customs and struggles changed history. There were six religions presented:- Buddhism – Hinduism – Islam – Judaism – Protestantism and Catholicism. There were a few weeks after finishing and Christmas break. We decided to refresh our memories by replaying a couple of the presentations. It is really amazing with a second look at what you have missed.

In January and February we are learning about Native Spiritually and their close bond with nature. We have learned that it is a calling to be a Medicine person – Spirit Doctor – their great respect for water as it washes away the hurts. They learn from their elders about whom they are and it is up to the elders to keep ceremonies alive and strong. When they are sent to the city to complete their education, they seem to lose the connection with nature and are usually too shy to ask for help.

The video about a healing ride with 38 Natives on horseback crossing the prairies the week before Christmas was re-enacting a forced march their ancestors did. They were received in the small towns along the way with celebrations of food and shelter for both people and animals. As a thank you the Natives shared some of their life experiences and customs. With this coming together, a trust was developed. There are more DVDs lined up to explore the culture and customs of the Native Communities. The end of February will be a session with photographs and video of the ancient Sun Dance Ceremony.

We will be finishing up the year with the Jesus Fatwah DVD presentation that Patrick Woodbeck did Wednesday evenings this winter. He very generously agreed to do it again during the morning Study Group as many of us find evening is not a comfortable time to venture outdoors.

There is always room for more at our table so come, join us Thursday mornings.

FINANCE AND STEWARDSHIP

Last year's report included this line "We will be writing another financial story in 2014 which will undoubtedly have another set of circumstances but as always there will be the ongoing theme of our amazing compassion and generosity." 2014 started like 2013, attendance was down and givings did not meet our needs. Just after Easter we started another 40-for-40 campaign, and our goal was to have 40 people increase their givings by \$40/month for the next year. By June we had about 25 people make the commitment and 119 people on PAR. This allowed us to keep paying the bills over summer. A few generous angels gifted us early in the fall which allowed WPUC to retire the Lift Loan. By October it looked like we would have a deficit around \$9,000 which was better than the budgeted \$17,000 loss. We started to feel a very positive energy from the congregation as well as a \$3,000 profit from Country Blend. We were blessed with many more angels and on December 31st our surplus was just over \$5,600. More proof that we are an amazing, compassionate and generous church family.

We will still face financial challenges in 2015 for our General Fund. If you can find it in your heart to provide more to the General Fund it would be very much appreciated. Our Stewardship goal for 2015 is to complete the 40-for-40 campaign and have 125 people using PAR which will get us closer to no deficit at the end of 2014.

We continue to be outstanding with our M&S givings, the 2014 budget was \$24,000 and we provided \$24,283.

This chart below is known as a 'step' chart which shows how many contributors are on each step. The amount given is for all causes and from both Envelope and PAR – General Fund, M&S, and Lift Loan etc.
