One of Manitoba's Top 40 Under 40!

Dr. Allison Dart is one of only 4 pediatric nephrologists (kidney doctors for children) in Manitoba. She is part of a team that provides highly specialized and technically complicated care to children from Manitoba, Northwestern Ontario and parts of Nunavut.

Allison leads in the CRRT program, which provides lifesaving intensive care dialysis to children who are critically ill. Dr. Dart is the pediatric lead on the FINISHED team, which works with First Nations communities throughout Manitoba to screen for early kidney disease.

As a researcher at the Children's Hospital Research Institute of Manitoba, she is also a member of the DREAM (Diabetes Research Envisioned and Accomplished in MB) research team. She is also leading the iCARE study, which is nationally funded to figure out the bio-psycho-social factors contributing to early kidney disease.

To conclude, she is the MB representative and co-chair of 2 CANN NET committees that identifies knowledge translation opportunities aimed at improving the care of patients. She manages to do all this while raising two small boys with her husband

Brent.

Finance and Stewardship

As we leave the season of Easter with feelings of joy and hope, our current reality is a \$13,485.56 deficit which is \$3,424.84 more than last year at this time. We have concern because our current deficit is worse than our budgeted deficit and that by year's end, we may not break even.

We just received another M&S certificate for our very generous givings in 2014.

The Boiler Fund has a current balance of \$13,223.99 and plans are being put in motion to have the new system in place over this summer for a total price of approximately \$30,000. The next hurdle we face is maintaining the service level we value.


Giving Gifts of Publicly Traded Securities are an attractive option. When you transfer to the Windsor Park United Church gifts of shares, bonds, bills, warrants, futures, or units of mutual funds listed on a prescribed public stock exchange, you will not pay tax on any capital gain. Because you also qualify for a charitable tax receipt based on the asset's fair market value, the net cost of a gift of securities may be less than a gift of an equivalent amount of cash depending on your tax bracket and the amount of capital gain you would incur.

The process of gifting securities is simple. At your direction, your broker will electronically transfer your securities to WPUC. The Finance Council knows the few fine details that your broker requires to make the transfer. The church then sells the stock on the day your gift is received. Based on the sale price, the WPUC issues you a charitable tax receipt for 100 percent of the funds

received. You may also wish to consider donating listed securities in your will instead of making a cash bequest. Because capital gains will not be taxed, your estate may realize considerable tax savings that may increase the amount going to your beneficiaries.

Our Financial Barometer - after months of meetings and trials, the Finance Committee has developed a visual aid to supplement our monthly financial summary which provides better clarity to our financial position versus the yearly budget.

Like a weather barometer, our barometer has zones that go from "stormy" red, "cloudy" yellow and "sunny" green. The border value from stormy to cloudy is the budgeted deficit of -\$13,875. The border value between cloudy and sunny is \$0. The black pointer shows where the current surplus (deficit) falls on the financial barometer

Thursday Morning Study Group

Our year has come to a close and it is time to think about what we would like to study in the fall. There is a world out there that we need to learn about. Thursday Morning Study Group is a safe place to ask questions.

We begin the Thursday after Thanksgiving in October and usually end the year on the Thursday before the long week-end in May.

This year we did three distinctly different DVD programs. "Religions of the World" was a presentation about six prominent religions - Buddhism - Hinduism - Islam - Judaism - Protestantism - Catholicism. It was a look into how each religion's customs and struggles changed the course of history.

Then we did a presentation on Native Spiritually. This was a series of individual DVDs we found on the internet:-

- Spirit Doctors (loaned from the U of MB)
- Dakota 38 (You Tube) -
- Circle of the Sun (NFB) a documentary
- The Northern Lights (NFB) a documentary
- Kainayssiwa: The People Go (NFB) a documentary
- Native Spirit (purchased from Amazon)
- and The Sun Dance Way (purchased from Amazon).

These were narrated by Aboriginal people and spoke of their great respect for nature. They learn about the different ceremonies from their Elders. When sent to the city to complete their education, they seem to lose their connection with nature and are usually too shy to ask for help. These DVD's are very interesting.

We have now just finished The Jesus Fatwah presentation that Patrick Woodbeck did Wednesday evening this winter. He very generously agreed to do it again for us. This was also interesting to learn how similar a Muslim is to a Christian, their sense of

family - belief in one God (Allah) - belief in angels - prophets - the Holy Book (Bible/Qu'ran).

Fatwah - is a noun - a spiritually instructive opinion usually given as the answer to a question about religious law.

The Jesus Fatwah - When asked to name the greatest commandment - Jesus issued a Fatwah Matthew 22:27 - Love God with all your heart - with all your soul - with all your mind.

Our numbers have grown this year and with the addition of Patrick, as our technical advisor, our discussions are very interesting. Our time together will have ended when you receive this SouthWinds, therefore giving you time to plan on checking us out when we start up again in October

There is always room for more at our table, so come and join us Thursday mornings from 9:30 - 11:00am. A cup of coffee/hot water and a warm welcome awaits you.
