With much thanks we did receive a \$20,000 grant from The Winnipeg Foundation for the roof repairs and shingles. Bill and Wayne arranged for the work to be done over the summer. God has blessed us with a fresh leak that does not appear to be related with the current repairs.

Of course, some things don't change, that is our love of family, food and fun. A part of our Homecoming Service will be a Potluck Lunch on **Sunday, November 3rd**.

Gloria and I are committed to providing a cake. Help will be required with setup, providing beverages and clean up. The expectation is that each attending family will provide something, be it a meat, potato/rice/pasta/bread, soup, vegetable or dessert.

Movie Review INSTANT FAMILY (2018)

Instant Family is a 2018 American comedy film starring Mark Wahlberg and Rose Byrne as parents who adopt three young children. Based on a true story, married couple Pete and Ellie Wagner, after being taunted by relatives who think they will never have kids, start considering the option of adopting a child. Initially half-serious, they eventually decide to enroll in a foster parent's course. Two social workers, Karen and Sharon, guide the hopeful parents on the steps to getting into becoming adoptive parents. The couples are brought to a fair where they have the chance to go up to kids that they are interested in adopting. Pete and Ellie walk by the teenagers, although Ellie shows hesitance over raising a teen. One of the teens, Lizzy, informs Ellie that they all know no one wants to adopt the teens.

Impressed with Lizzy's behavior, Pete and Ellie talk to Karen and Sharon over potentially taking her in. The social workers inform the couple that Lizzy's mother is a drug addict who is currently in jail, and she set their home on fire because she left the crack pipe lit. It also turns out that Lizzy has two younger siblings, Juan and Lita. Although this seems like more of a challenge for Pete and Ellie, they agree to meet the siblings. The first meeting, however, does not seem to result in an immediate "bond", and Pete and Ellie reconsider.

Pete and Ellie have Thanksgiving dinner with Ellie's family, where they announce that they intend to walk back on their decision to adopt. Once the rest of the family shows relief, making it clear that nobody really believed that Pete and Ellie could make it, Ellie gets upset and decides that they will go

through with the foster care to prove that they can be good parents.

Although this movie was advertised as a comedy, and there are some very funny comic gems in the movie, it is also a wonderfully accurate representation of the experiences of what fostering children entails. Both Mark Wahlberg and Rose Byrne play Pete and Ellie with a sense of naiveté that underscores how unprepared they truly were for the issues and challenges that came along with being foster parents. The realistic way in which this movie portrays those issues and challenges is both refreshing and challenging to watch. As a child-care provider I know stated, "anyone who wants to become a foster parent should watch this movie first." The movie is both funny and heart-breaking, but in the end it honestly examines the lives of children who have been apprehended and live their lives in the foster care system. The movie speaks to the mistrust that many of these children have and the consequences of that mistrust; acting out, anger, overly emotional, defiance, and the difficulty when returning from visits with birth parents. None of these experiences are sugar coated but rather portrayed with honesty and sensitivity. This movie was well worth the time and I would recommend it to anyone who is willing to both laugh and cry.

Pop Culture Corner

I remember many, many, many years ago when the first Star Wars movie "A New Hope" came out, 1977 to be exact, and I found myself in awe of the special effects in this movie. I think that in many ways that movie ushered in a new era of movie making with big budgets and even bigger special effects. So 42 years later the final movie in the 9 movie series is set to be released later this fall and so I thought that it might be a good time to reflect on these movies. The movies all revolve around the struggle between the forces of "good" in the universe, epitomized by the rebels, the Jedi, and the light side of

the force, against the "evil," reflected in the empire, the First Order, the Sith, and the dark side of the force. In all of the movies this theme of light versus dark is lived out in varying degrees of importance to the story line that is until the very last movie that came out "The Last Jedi." In all of the preceding movies there is an understanding that one must either live in or follow only the light side, or the dark side. It is very much an understanding that it is an either/or universe within a binary understanding of the force, you are either with the light side of the force or the dark. Much of the struggle within the first 7 movies comes from this place, as many characters struggle to live only within one side of the force. Yet there is an understanding throughout all the movies that there must be balance in the force, as there must be balance in everything in life. It is only in most current movie that this idea shifts with the character of Rey. Rey is a nobody, from a nothing planet on the outer rim and yet she has this natural ability to use the force. What is different about Rey is that she naturally embraces both the light and dark side of the force. The balance that is sought is not between individuals who struggle to live in only side of the force, but rather the balance is found between the light and dark sides of the force within the individual. This is a profound shift in the important part of these movies and I look forward to seeing where they take this in the next movie.

It is interesting to think about this in the context of our lives. It is important to realize that each one of us has those places of light and dark inside of us and to know that in the midst of those dark places, light still exists. Also on the other side, in the midst of light, dark places are sometimes not too far away. We too might be challenged to accept those dark places and light places in our own lives and find balance that can bring wholeness.


