# The Story Behind the Windsor Park Community Hub

Windsor Park United Church received news in mid-February that it will be awarded a grant from the Stay-At-Home program run by the Manitoba government.

One of the caveats of the grant was that Windsor Park Community Hub had to spend the grant money and deliver programming by March 31, 2021. Ryan Kuffner knew an event organizer that would act as the coordinator. They would coordinate the website setup, technology and technicians, programming content and advertising. Within a few days they had a proposed plan and budget that was acceptable to the Windsor Park Community Hub committee. The committee realized that they did not have the luxury of time and decisions needed to be made swiftly. It was on a Sunday in early March around 11:30 a.m. when the website designer reached out to me to see if we had a logo for "the HUB". As is my usual Sunday morning routine, I was partaking in the after-service coffee ZOOM time. I asked for wisdom from the group on what the logo should represent.



Themes like welcoming, inclusion, community were mentioned. The colours should come from the Olympic rings which represents the common colours of the flags of the

world. We suggested stylized figures be arranged like spokes with one hand linking inside with the other hand reaching out to others. The conversation took about five minutes and the guidance was passed on to the designer. Later in the week about a half dozen suggested logos were presented. I like to believe that Jesus would approve of the wisdom of the group.

On a personal note, I was the only participant for the virtual tour of the Human Rights Museum. Since I have visited the Museum many times, the tour guide could go "off script" and share stories and details not covered in the regular tour. I felt blessed for the experience and was extremely impressed by the guide's knowledge of not only the exhibits but of their understanding of human rights. I complimented them at the end for which they were grateful. They also said they have extremely busy with virtual tours with many of the groups coming from outside of Manitoba.

### What I Did For My Summer Vacation

The summer of 2020 proved different for all of us. For me it was the fact that the Winnipeg Fringe Festival had been cancelled. I am not a great traveler so instead of wandering far and wide, I usually narrow my sights on the Exchange District in downtown Winnipeg for a couple of weeks in the summer and travel to the various Fringe Festival venues (usually on foot, but sometimes by orange pumpkin).



Since 2020 saw a cancelled Fringe, I took part in something a little different. I bought eggs online. More specifically I took part in the auction of Egg Art by Peter Czehryn. Peter puts a unique spin on the art of pysanky.

Pysanky (Ukrainian Easter

Eggs) is a traditional Folk Art using wax and dyes to decorate eggs. Peter brings forty years of experience in egg writing to this auction.

The auction was held to benefit the Canadian Hemophilia Society, Manitoba Chapter. A dozen plus eggs were auctioned off bringing in a total of \$5,050.00. for the Society.

"The Canadian Hemophilia Society, Manitoba Chapter Inc. (CHS-MC) is a grassroots, not-forprofit organization that was formalized in 1965 and incorporated in 1979. The Chapter was initially created to support individuals and families managing Hemophilia, an inherited bleeding disorder. The Current organization has grown to embrace all inherited bleeding disorders. This includes rare bleeding disorders and the greatest addition being affected by a common disorder, Von Willebrand's disease. The mission of CHS-MC is to: 'improve the quality of life for those affected by hemophilia and other inherited bleeding disorders through support, service, research, education, and advocacy.'"

On the band of the egg, Peter tried to be colourful and bright to make it a spring-like motif. One of my favourite flowers, we had poppies growing in our yard on Heather Road when I was growing up.









My third and final successful bid was on "Art Nouveau Floral". This design was inspired by artists Mucha and Mackintosh posters.


Here are the programs that we had just completed.

Child Activities (yellow) Senior Activities (green)


























