Reopening for Worship

Reopening Committee

The reopening committee has met and come up with protocols and guidelines and we are very excited to announce an anticipated start date of Sunday October 10 (Thanksgiving)!

- 1. We strongly encourage that anyone considering attending an in-person service be double vaccinated.
- 2. Masks will be required inside the building at all times.
- 3. Social distancing of 2 meters (6 feet) where possible.
- 4. Standard COVID-19 questions will be asked each week you attend service.
- 5. Waivers will need to signed the first time you enter the building and will be kept on file for one (1) year.
- 6. You will be asked to call in for registration to attend the service (Thursday morning prior to that week's service between 9:00 a.m.-11:00 a.m. more details will follow).
- 7. A maximum of 60 people will be able to attend the service and this does include the worship team.
- 8. You will be asked to sit in a pew for now, as the back of the church is reserved for our ushers and greeters (social distanced).
- 9. You can only sit with those from your own household for now.
- 10. There will be no Bible Adventures at this time.
- 11. There will be no after church coffee at this time.
- 12. The basement will not be open at this time.

We are closely following the public health orders, United Church of Canada guidelines, and monitoring how schools and post-secondary education facilities are opening. By waiting until October, we will see how the reopening of schools will fare in regards to the variants of concern. We know it has been a long, and at times, very stressful time for everyone, and we hope that October will bring some long-awaited smiles to everyone in WPUC.

Please note that if for medical or personal reasons you are unable to return to an inperson worship service, the virtual services will be continuing.

We hope to see many of you in October!

As may be mentioned in previous Southwinds, we have secured grants from the Winnipeg Foundation and UCC Embracing the Spirit and hired a Hub Coordinator - Maddy Vanderhooft. With this position filled the Finance and Stewardship Council can execute on its vision of using the Church building and resources from the "Stay at Home" grant to bring more self-sufficiency to our building costs while full filling our congregational mission. Welcome Maddy.

Earlier this month I happened to be approaching the church around lunch time and watched a motorized wheelchair zip up the ramp to the front door with a helper in tow.

The helper reached into a backpack on the chair and took out some books for the *Little Free Library*. It struck me that we made a design mistake of not having wheelchair access to the library level. I imagine baby carriages and wagons would also find it inconvenient. Talking with Patrick Woodbeck and Bill Belsham we believe a long path with a gentle slope could be built from the street sidewalk near our Memorial Garden entrance to the landing in front of the library. We believe we can secure a grant to assist with the construction costs. If you would like to assist with this project, please contact me to ensure all are truly welcome.

After many years of having between 90 and 105 PAR participants we are now down to 89 and the number of Canada Helps donations has leveled off. The number of envelopes being dropped at the church has also dwindled. There is hope this may rebound in October. The \$15,000 we received in MB Government COVID grants offset the loss in expected rental income. We do not expect anymore of those grants but are currently unsure how many past renters will return. A constant is our congregational staffing costs which expanded since some staff worked during their usual "down time" while other were owed for past missed vacation days. The Finance and Stewardship Council has asked the Executive to make some hard choices on how to fund our expenses with just a promise to replace the funds when we "return to normal".

Everybody has a hand in the "Welcome Mat" to our church programming, at this time it represents what was expected from the past, but it may reflect what we can afford in the future.

CRUELLA, DISNEY 2021

Many of us have grown up with many of the Disney animated films and as such we recognize many of the iconic names that come to be associated with these films. When we hear Maleficent, we immediately think of Sleeping Beauty. When we hear Ariel, we immediately think of the Little Mermaid. When we hear Sleepy, Doc, Grumpy, Dopey, well, we immediately think of Snow White. And when we hear Cruella, we immediately think of Cruella DeVil from 101 Dalmatians. Many of us know this story, the story of Pongo and Perdita and their 101 puppies. It is the story of the evil Cruella who wants to make a coat out of the puppies and as is usual in a

Disney film what transpires is a comedy of errors as Cruella and her sidekicks, *Jasper* and *Horace*, try to kidnap the puppies.
