

Married couple behind Winnipeg Soup Fairies honoured with Queen's Platinum Jubilee

DELIVERING COMFORT

A PASSION for community involvement has remained constant for Paulette Côté and her husband, Peter Czehryn, since they first met more than 30 years ago. The retired couple founded the Winnipeg Soup Fairies, a group of volunteers initially established to serve homemade soup and bread to those who fell ill during the pandemic.

The couple and an expanding number of helpers quickly began to fill a larger community need, including people living with cancer, individuals without supports and people newly home from hospital.

They partnered with a licensed kitchen, allowing them to connect with various community groups to deliver nourishing meals and comfort to a large number of people in need, serving more than 1,750 people last year.

They were surprised and humbled

by the couple's compassionate, loving stance for anyone who crossed her path.

"We had been grateful to bring her home to die of cancer and to experience so many healing family and friends' visits on the deck at the lake, giving her the death at home with grace and dignity she had longed for. That experience — with the juxtaposition of so many others suffering with COVID and other illnesses at home alone without, or with limited, supports as they lay isolated — drove the birth of the Winnipeg Soup Fairies."

When Côté's cousin became very ill with COVID-19 early on in the pandemic, the couple responded by dropping off soup.

"Then it was a sibling's family, and then friends we were hearing about, and soon, once it was made public, the demand and space needs meant our homemade chicken soup production moved into St. Mary's Road United Church's licensed kitchen, where we have been welcomed into a community with its own strong sense of service

"We have been joined by so many others with their own stories who work hard as retirees (and also many younger employed and unemployed friends and family members) to hold the fabric of our society together.

"While Peter and I have co-ordinated the Winnipeg Soup Fairies, taking in requests and chatting with each of our soup recipients prior to delivery, and initially doing all the food preparation, we soon had a number of organizations and volunteers contact us to say they were interested in becoming soup fairies too," she said. "Over the last two years, we have easily had from 250 to 300 generous people offer to volunteer, drop off food items needed for soups, bread and cookies, and of course our most generous benefactors, who have sent contributions from Florida, to Halifax, to Vancouver, with most being centred right here from our incredibly caring citizens of Winnipeg."

The couple now acts as a co-or-

"We would encourage everyone to light a candle in memory that evening so the people of Winnipeg know they are not forgotten and they will be remembered."

"There are many experiences that have been kind to us and have been incredible. We have chosen to give what we can, while we are here. Truly, we have been blessed with a number of folks who have shown courage over comfort during the pandemic; it's the caregivers, medical professionals and wonderful helpers who perform simple daily tasks who together make the difference in the community."

Hallmark Movie Magic Madness

Fake snow, down parkas in July, and more Christmas trees than you can imagine!!!

Working on a Hallmark movie set is definitely a unique experience, and one that is both fun and chaotic! I've had the opportunity to work on three different Hallmark sets in my career and while the energy on set is usually positive and everyone's in a good mood, things can get pretty chaotic in the process of creating a winter wonderland. There are so many different departments working simultaneously and quickly to make it look like it's the middle of December and full of holiday cheer, as well as making sure all the technical aspects are working correctly and ready to roll when they call "ACTION"!



This year, they filmed over 20 Hallmark movies in Winnipeg alone, which means that they bang them out pretty fast! (one movie is typically shot in three weeks.) My workdays on set are about 10 - 12 hours long and they manage to shoot a huge

chunk of the script in that amount of time. When I arrive on set in the morning, my job is to get the camera set up and ready to shoot as fast as possible. I'm also the one to mark the actors which is really cool because I get to be up close and personal with the actors - Teri Hatcher was hilarious and always made everyone laugh on the set of **Kiss Before Christmas!**

Sometimes it takes some time to find where set is, but when you're working on a Hallmark movie it's nice not to have to worry about that since it's real easy to spot the one house that's decked out in lights, Christmas wreaths, and Santa decorations in the middle of summer. It's pretty neat when you're filming in a public area or in a public building and people walk by and know exactly what you're shooting - I've been asked more than once "Ooh which Hallmark movie is this one?!" It's a really fun atmosphere to work in, too, because it's not a super high pressure situation and it's not like it's heavy or serious subject matter you're dealing with, which lets you really just focus on your job but also have fun and not worry too much about messing up!

One Hallmark set I worked on, throughout the three weeks of filming, multiple crew members started taking small bits of the set dressing and wearing it all day. By the last week of production, it was a competition of who could wear the most pieces of set dressing they'd collected! There were people wearing ornaments as earrings, tinsel in their hair, fake snow as a shawl and I remember my colleagues and I in the camera department had taken a few strings of Christmas lights and strung them around our camera carts. I had also stuck a snowman stuffy to the top of my camera as a little buddy to keep my camera operator company!

Another great memory I have of working on Hallmarks is on one set, someone always played Christmas music on their phone while we were setting up in the mornings - I'm not gonna lie, by the end of the production, I would've rather listened to anything else!

I hope to work on more Hallmark movies in the future! Until then, enjoy your batch of new Hallmark movies this holiday season!

What it Means to be at Church

As we've moved through the various phases of the pandemic, we have had a lot of time to think about what it means to be the church at this time. For the past two years, even though we were able to keep worship services going and connect with many people online, we really missed the in-person community, and each time we were able to meet brought about a great sense of joy and a feeling that we weren't going through this difficult time alone. There have been many instances of people shedding tears unexpectedly at seeing church friends or hearing the live music on their return to the building for worship.

I was reading an interesting article the other day in Zoomer magazine. In an article by David Cravit, he reflects on data from a collection of studies of 75,534 women over a 16-year period. The studies concluded that:

“Frequent attendance at religious services was associated with significantly lower risk of all-cause, cardiovascular, and cancer mortality among women. Religion and spirituality may be an underappreciated resource that physicians could explore with their patients, as appropriate... Many other studies have found important correlations between the presence of strong social networks (implicit in regular church attendance) and longevity. Regular church attendance might also promote greater peace of mind and less stress, and there is a growing body of research suggesting a relationship between lower levels of stress and longevity...”

If you are looking for a spiritual connection with God and others and want to build a multi-generational community and support system, you can find all of that at church. Get involved and see what happens!




Christmas Movie Review

THE NOEL DIARY

Okay so many of you know that I am fan of those cheesy Hallmark Christmas movies and I watch many of them each year. I was looking through Netflix the other day for a movie to watch and I was looking for something that I might not have to think too much about, but would just pass some time. I came across “The Noel Diary” starring Justin Hartley, whose most recent work includes ‘This Is Us,’ as Jacob Turner and Barrett Doss as Rachel.

To be honest I did not hold out high hopes that this would be a good movie but I was pleasantly surprised. This was a heartfelt movie that explored difficult topics with gentleness and honesty.



Jacob is a successful writer who, just before Christmas, has to go and clean out his late mother’s home. They had been estranged since Jacob was a young man, as he left home unable to deal with his mother’s depression and mental health challenges after the death of his older brother many years earlier. His father had previously left and Jacob had no relationship with either of his parents. When he gets to his mother’s house he finds the home of a hoarder as items are piled up in every room and Jacob is clearly overwhelmed.

A young woman, Rachel, shows up one day. Rachel was adopted as a baby and she is now looking for her birth mother. All she has is a first name, Noel, and the address of the house where she apparently worked as a live-in babysitter for Jacob’s family. Rachel has been questioning why her mother gave her up and wondered if she was unwanted.

As they clean out the house they find Noel’s diary. This sets the two off to find Noel and it takes them to Jacob’s estranged father’s house, where difficult conversations are had around loss and coping with grief. In reading the diary Rachel sees that Noel loved her, but was unable to care for her being a teen herself who was kicked out of her house by her parents. Jacob eventually finds Noel and gives her back her diary. Noel tells Jacob that if Rachel wants to meet she has been waiting to meet her daughter again.

In the course of the movie Jacob, who has never let anyone in, begins to fall in love with Rachel and it is only at the end that Rachel realizes that she also loves Jacob.

Of course, no good Christmas movie would be any good if the two leads didn’t end up together, which they do, but this was a movie that did not shy away for challenging topics that many of us deal with during these times. If you have Netflix, I encourage you to give it a watch.


